Representations about the draft plan or support

Comments must be made by **30**th **May** and need to state clearly which policies in the draft plan or supporting documentation the comments refer to.

As well as residents and businesses in Brickhill, those bodies listed in Schedule 1 of the 2012 Regulations who the Parish Council considers may be affected by the draft plan will also be consulted. There include: Bedford Borough Council, Historic England, Natural England, the Environment Agency, local schools and churches, and the Harpur Trust.

A Neighbourhood Plan for Brickhill

19 parish councils in Bedford Borough and thousands across England have agreed Neighbourhood Plans for their parishes. The aims of Neighbourhood Plans are to agree planning policies for their areas. These are then used when determining planning applications. Parish Councils can only comment on planning applications, but once a Neighbourhood Plan is agreed, the policies are also relevant for the Borough Council.

The Neighbourhood Plan has to relate to the Borough Local Plan. There are no sites in Brickhill parish that have been identified in the Local Plan for development. Based on the comments received from previous questionnaires (Feb 2020 and Aug 2023), the themes the plan has focused on are the protection of Brickhill's green open spaces, sustainable development, transport and design, and sustainable design. The Plan seeks to support the retention of the Brickhill Drive and Avon Drive neighbourhood centres and is supportive of the expansion of existing community facilities.



Protecting Brickhill's green open spaces

Brickhill is renowned for its green spaces. Only three of these are currently designated as Local Green Space, which gives equivalent protection from development as Green Belt. Following consultation with residents and discussion by the parish council, an additional seven sites are proposed for designation as Local Green Space. These sites are important for various reasons including: recreation, environment and visual amenity,



What happens next

After the closing date, we will consider the representations and the extent to which any concerns expressed can be addressed. The draft plan, amended as necessary, will be considered by the parish council. If approved it is then submitted to the Borough Council who will publicise the draft. This provides a further opportunity for people to make representations about the plan's proposals. The Borough Council will publicise details about when and how to make representations.

The next stages after that will be:

- Submission of the draft plan for independent examination.
- Publication of the independent examiner's report and decisions.
- A referendum of residents of the draft plan and
- If the referendum result supports the draft plan, the bringing of the plan into force.

The draft Neighbourhood Plan contains the following policies:

Policy BR-SG1 Local Employment: supporting office and other workspace (Use Class E) on brownfield sites and the retention of existing employment sites for employment use.

Policy BR-SG2 Local Facilities: supporting new community facilities near the Brickhill Drive and Avon Drive neighbourhood centres and the expansion of existing community facilities.

Policy BR-SG3 Housing Mix and Standards: supporting infill development within existing built frontages.
 Opposing the loss of single storey housing and other housing suitable for the elderly.

Policy BR-LE1 Green Environment: development should not harm the ecology or trees and should achieve biodiversity gains. Seek opportunities to enhance recreational value of green open spaces.

Policy BR-LE2 Local Green Space: designate three areas as Local Green Space: Falcon Avenue, Brickhill Drive/Foster's Brow, Brickhill Drive/Rooksmead pond.

Policy BR-LE3 Local Heritage: Avoid harm to the historic lane in Falcon Avenue, which led to Clapham Park.

Development should have no adverse impact on five non-designated heritage assets.

Policy BR-SD1 Place and Context: Development should complement the local context and create safe environments through provision of active frontages to overload roads and spaces. Landscape design should be integral to any development.

Policy BR-SD2 Green Design: Balance carbon and other environmental impacts by incorporating positive green features in design and landscaping, taking into account the Plan's Green Guidance Note.

Policy BR-TM1 Sustainable Transport: Enhancing pedestrian connectivity, sustainable forms of transport and the inclusion of electric charging points.

Policy BR-TM2 Footpaths and Cycleways: No significant adverse impact on footways and cycleways. Enhancing footpaths and cycleways where opportunities allow.

Parking Problems in Brickhill.....

Residents have raised a couple of issues with the Parish Council. Highways issues are the responsibility of Bedford Borough Council so the Parish Council has raised them with it.

Van laden with pallets on Avon Drive near
Highfield House: The Borough Council is
aware of this vehicle as the owner has several
parked around the town being used as on
street storage. It has served a Community
Protection Notice on the owner requiring them
to remove all these vehicles from the
Borough. CPN's allow the Borough Council to
specify this person must not store any vehicle
like this within the borough and is an ongoing
requirement.

Transit vans parked in the layby on Avon Drive adjacent to Waveney Green: The Borough Council are looking at whether any parking restrictions can be imposed. There is a road safety issue as the layby is used by parents dropping off/collecting from Brickhill Primary.

Sundays 10 – 11 a.m. (weekly)




